Six cops killed in Pak road accident

Islamabad: As many as six policemen were killed after a car and a truck collided with each other on the Quetta-Karachi national highway, reported Dawn. The cops were on their way to Quetta. A truck coming from the opposite side hit the car, killing all six men on the spot and some persons sustained injuries. "The cops were coming home for Eid after attending a course at training college," said SSP Khoso. He said efforts were underway to retrieve bodies from the car wreckage. Meanwhile, in another incident, two Pakistani police officers were killed and four injured after people, whom the officials called "dacoits", opened fire in Punjab province.

4 killed in Alabama shooting

Dadeville (US): Four people have been killed and multiple people injured during a shooting at a birthday party around 10:30 pm on Saturday in Dadeville, the authorities said. There was no initial confirmation about what led to the shooting. It was not immediately known if a suspect was in custody. "There were four lives tragically lost in this incident and there's been a multitude of injuries," said an official at a news conference Sunday morning.

Satellite delays flights in Taipei

Taipei: Flights out of northern Taiwan were delayed on Sunday after China launched a rocket carrying a satellite that dropped debris into water north of the capital Taipei. While the satellite launch had no obvious military purpose, it comes after China held large-scale military drills in response to Taiwanese President Tsai Ing-wen's transit visit to the United States earlier this month, during which she met U.S. House Speaker Kevin McCarthy in California. Taiwan's Defence Ministry issued a statement on public media, saying it had monitored the 9:36 am launch from the Jiuquan base in northwestern China.

6 soldiers slain in Indonesia

Jayapura: Separatist gunmen opened fire on a military post in Indonesia's restive Papua province, killing at least six soldiers and leaving dozens of others missing, the army and the rebels said on Sunday. Attackers from the West Papua Liberation Army, the armed wing of the Free Papua Movement, carried out the assault against soldiers in the district of Nduga, a stronghold of separatists who have battled Indonesian rule since the early 1960s. Papua military spokesperson Col Herman Taryani said the soldiers at Mugi army post were part of a group deployed to search for Phillip Mark Mehtrens, a New Zealand pilot for Indonesian aviation company who was abducted by rebels in February.

Meteor explodes in Israel in daylight

Jerusalem: The Israeli Astronomical Association has reported a bolide explosion seen in daylight in the country's sky. The bolide, a particularly bright meteor, was seen flashing across the sky at 17:16 local time (14:16 GMT), according to reports, photos, and videos received at the IAA released. Igal Pat-El, a member of the International Astronomical Union, told reporters that according to the observed colours, it was a meteorite made of stone, probably tens of centimetre long at most, which completely disintegrated in the air and did not reach the ground. "Metors are observed every night, but seeing one from an inhabited place, in daylight, and over Israel is very rare," he added.

Protest in Czech over inflation

Prague: Thousands of people rallied again in the Czech capital on Sunday to protest high inflation and demand the government's resignation. It was the second such rally at Prague's Wenceslas Square after one on March 11 that was organised by a new political party known as PRO under an "against the poverty" banner. The demonstrators, speakers at the protest and the head of the populist group, Jindrich Rajchl, blamed the European Union and the Czech government for soaring inflation and all repeatedly called on the current five-party coalition to resign. "We want the government's resignation," Rajchl told the crowd. "Resign, resign," the protesters chanted.

Rivals in Sudan battle for 2nd day

56 killed as fighting involving truck-mounted machine guns and war planes rages in Khartoum

The Sudanese military and a powerful paramilitary group battled for control of the chaos-stricken nation for a second day on Sunday, signalling they were unwilling to end hostilities despite mounting diplomatic pressure to cease fire.

Heavy fighting involving armoured vehicles, truck-mounted machine guns and war planes raged on Sunday in the capital of Khartoum, the adjoining city of Omdurman and in flashpoints across the country.

The rival forces are believed to have tens of thousands of fighters each in the capital alone.

At least 56 civilians were reported killed, including three employees of the UN food agency. The Sudan Doctors' Syndicate said it believed there were dozens of additional deaths among the rival forces. It said close to 600 people were wounded, including civilians and fighters.

The clashes are part of a power struggle between Gen Abdel-Fattah Burhan, the commander of the armed forces, and Gen Mohammed Hamdan Dagalo, the head of the Rapid Support Forces group.

The two generals are former allies who jointly orchestrated an October 2021 military coup that derailed Sudan's short-lived transition to democracy.

In recent months, internationally backed negotiations revived hopes for an orderly

transition to democracy. However, growing tensions between Burhan and Dagalo eventually delayed a deal with political parties.

In Khartoum and Omdurman, fighting was reported around military headquarters, Khartoum International Airport and state television headquarters.

A senior military official said RSF fighters clashed with troops at military headquarters early on Sunday and that a fire broke out at a facility for ground troops.

"The battles have not stopped," said rights advocate Tahani Abass who lives near military headquarters. "They are shooting against each other in streets. It's an all-out war in residential areas." Abass said her family spent the night huddled on the ground floor of their home. "No one was able to sleep and the kids were crying and screaming with every explosion," she said.

The military and the RSF both claimed to be in control of strategic locations in Khartoum and elsewhere in the county. Their claims couldn't be independently verified.

Both sides signalled late on Saturday that they were unwilling to negotiate.

Burhan's military called for dismantling the RSF, which it labelled a "rebellious militia." Dagalo told the satellite news network Al Arabiya that he ruled out negotiation and called on Burhan to surrender.

Jaishankar condoles death of Indian

New Delhi: External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar on Sunday expressed grief over the death of an Indian national working in a Dal Group Company in Khartoum, who was hit by a stray bullet.

Taking to Twitter, Jaishankar said, "Deeply grieved to learn about the death of an Indian national in Khartoum. The embassy is making all efforts to extend fullest assistance to the family. We will continue to monitor developments."

Sharing details about the deceased, Indian Embassy in Sudan tweeted, "It has been reported that Albert Augustine, an Indian National who got hit by a stray bullet yesterday succumbed to his injuries. The embassy is in touch with family and medical authorities to make further arrangements." -ANI

Pak minister dies in car mishap, 5 booked

Pakistan Religious Affairs Minister Mufti Abdul Shakoor was killed in a road accident in Islamabad's Red Zone area, and five people have been booked in this connection, media reports said on Sunday.

The accident occurred on Saturday when Shakoor was proceeding towards Secretariat Chowk on Constitution Avenue and his car was hit by a passenger vehicle, Dawn quoted police as saying. The police said all five occupants of the other vehicle were arrested and shifted to police station for investigation.

The minister was rushed to a private hospital where he was declared brought dead.

Shakoor was a Jamiat Ulema-Islam Fazl (JUI-F) leader.

Pakistan President Arif Alvi and Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif expressed their condolences and paid tribute to the departed soul.

Sharif tweeted, "I am deeply saddened to hear of the death of my friend, colleague and important member of the cabinet, Mufti Abdul Shakoor. He was an ideological political activist and a good human being. May Allah grant forgiveness to the deceased and patience to the bereaved."

An FIR was lodged in which complainant Haji Qudratullah said the accident occurred due to other driver's inattentiveness and carelessness.

"There's a tendency of

long distance drivers free-wheeling to save on fuel. This is carelessness because in case of an emergency one has no control," he said. The mourners had travelled more than 150 kilometres to attend the funeral and were returning late in the evening.

India, the current G-20 president, is ready to share its strengths and successes with the world. India's Ambassador to the US, Tarun Singh Sandhu, here has said, asserting that the India-US partnership will not only benefit the two countries, but its rewards will be reaped around the globe.

India assumed the year-long presidency of the G-20 in December last year and aims to host a leaders' summit in New Delhi in early September.

The G-20 is an important forum of the world's 20 major developed and developing economies.

"India is a beautiful garden of diverse colours. We love and enjoy each of these festivals in the spirit of spring," he said.

Sandhu also paid glowing tributes to Dr Bhimrao Ambedkar, the architect of the Indian Constitution on his 132nd birth anniversary.

"Dr Ambedkar studied in Columbia University here in the US, which played an important role in shaping his thoughts and vision. We know people, three small words with which the Indian and American Constitution start to reflect the story of liberty, freedom, non-violence, and rule of law, that we both nourish and cherish as nations," Sandhu said.

Sandhu said, 75 years ago, when independent India was born, "we were a nation, fighting for our own survival. We had to depend on others, even for our basic needs, such as food. Neither history, nor geography, gave us comfort."

"Today, India is the fifth largest economy globally; world's second largest agricultural producer; home to the third largest tech ecosystem in the world, creating a unicorn almost every week; running the world's largest renewable energy expansion programme; largest financial inclusion programme; the largest producer of generic drugs globally and the world's largest producer of movies," he added.

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G7 vows to shift to renewable energy

Energy and environment ministers of the Group of Seven wealthy nations vowed on Sunday to work to hasten the shift toward cleaner, renewable energy, but set no timetable for phasing out coal-fired power plants as they wrapped up two days of talks in the northern Japanese city of Sapporo.

The officials issued a 36-page climate plan laying out their commitments ahead of a G-7 summit in Hiroshima in May.

Japan won endorsements from fellow G-7 countries for its own national strategy emphasising so-called clean coal, hydrogen and nuclear energy to help ensure its energy security.

"Recognising the current global energy crisis and economic disruptions, we reaffirm our commitment to accelerating the clean energy transition to net-zero greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions by 2050 at the latest," the communiqué says.

The leaders reiterated the need to urgently reduce carbon emissions and achieve a "predominantly decarbonised power sector" by 2050.

"We call on and will work with other countries to end new unabated coal-fired power generation projects globally as soon as possible to accelerate the clean energy transition in a just manner," the document says.

The stipulation that countries rely on "predominantly" clean energy by 2050 leaves room for continuation of fossil-fuel fired power.

But the ministers agreed to prioritise steps toward phasing out "unabated" coal power generation - plants that do not employ mechanisms to capture emissions and prevent them from escaping into the atmosphere.

US Special Presidential Envoy for Climate John Kerry said the meetings were "really constructive."

"I think the unity for the goal that was expressed of phasing out unabated fossil fuels is a very important statement," Kerry said.

The call to action comes as China and other developing

countries step up demands for more help in phasing out fossil fuels and stabilising energy prices and supplies amid disruptions from Russia's war on Ukraine.

The issue of setting a timeline for phasing out coal-fired power plants is a longstanding sticking point. Japan relies on coal for nearly one-third of its power generation and is also promoting the use of so-called clean coal, using technology to capture carbon emissions, to produce hydrogen - which produces only water when used as fuel.
